

Urban Indigenous Homeward Bound



UIHB is a four-year initiative that aims to systematically address the barriers sole-parenting Indigenous women face when trying to find meaningful employment and prosperity for themselves and their children.

UIHB is founded on the provision of key supports such as:

- Housing stabilization supports
- * Access to culture Childcare supports
- Life skills resources and post-secondary educational opportunities
- * Transportation
- Case coordination
- * Health access and mental health supports



2018 - Urban Indigenous Homeward Bound Program welcomed first families






UIHB Program Goal



Cost of UIHB

Per person: \$135,812

Annual cost of public service usage for one individual based on case study calculations

Per person: \$ 24,135

Annual cost of UIHB program for one individual

Province: \$40.7 million

Annual cost of public service usage for 300 individuals based on case study calculations

Province: \$ 7.2 million

Annual cost of UIHB program for provincial program serving 300 individuals.



UIHB Alignment with the Calls for Justice

The UIHB program aligns to a number of Calls for Justice from the *National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls,* including:

- 1.1 All governments, with Indigenous peoples, develop and implement a National Action Plan to address violence. The Plan should ensure equitable access to basic rights such as employment, housing, education, safety, and health care programs must be no-barrier and apply regardless of Status or location
- 1.3 All governments, when developing budgets and determining government activities, to prioritize resourcing of measures to eliminate social, economic, cultural and political marginalization
- 4.4 All governments to provide supports and resources for educational, training, and employment opportunities for all Indigenous women, girls, and 2SLGBTQQIA people available within all Indigenous communities.





UIHB Alignment with Provincial Mandates

The UIHB program aligns with the following priorities of the provincial government:

- Improving individuals' connection to the labour market
- * Reducing long-term reliance on social assistance
- * Reducing red tape
- * Ending violence in Indigenous communities




